I became interested in pursuing an internship with TDH for my APEx after I began working with them as a FoodCORE interviewer. I really loved working with TDH and everything they stand for. I had reached out to the Foodborne and Enterics program director to express my interest in completing my internship with the Tennessee Department of Health and filled out the Tennessee Department of Health intern application and was lucky enough to be placed within the FED programs Center of Excellence and also worked on Live Poultry outbreaks throughout my internship. My internship went from August 2022-May 2023 and consisted of analyzing and creating reports for TN Food Safety Centers of Excellence Foodborne Outbreak Investigation Online Training Activity evaluations and developing Outbreak Response trainings. I was also able to work with the Tennessee Department of Health and Agriculture to develop and distribute materials describing risks of salmonellosis associated with live poultry, clean and input surveillance data and conduct a summary of my findings for the 2022 live poultry Salmonella outbreak including a review of demographics, clinical and exposure information. From my APEx I was also able to write an abstract that has been accepted to several conferences including TPHA and InFORM. After graduation, I was able to get a contracted position with the Healthcare Associated Infection and Antimicrobial Resistance program as an Epidemiologist with the Tennessee Department of Health where I get to continue to use all the skills and knowledge acquired from my APEx and my time at UTK.
